Americans Who Tell the Truth: A Conversation with George Washington

About the Exhibition:

The exhibition, "**A Conversation with George Washington**," aims to foster constructive reflection on the inclusion of all Americans, offering opportunities for dialogue and learning to deepen our sense of civic engagement and citizenship—a central theme for the Maxwell community. This rotating collection of portraits from Robert Shetterly's *Americans Who Tell the Truth* series is displayed in the foyer outside the Maxwell Auditorium, surrounding the statue of George Washington. The exhibition encourages reflection and discussion on topics such as the evolution of citizenship in America, the role of protest and social movements in democratic society, the need for more expansive conceptions of human rights, and the power of individuals to contribute to social and political change.news.syr.edu

About Robert Shetterly:

Robert Shetterly, born in 1946 in Cincinnati, Ohio, is an American artist renowned for his portrait series, *Americans Who Tell the Truth*. After

graduating from Harvard College in 1969 with a degree in English Literature, Shetterly transitioned to visual arts, teaching himself drawing, printmaking, and painting. His career includes illustrating for various publications and approximately 30 books. The *Americans Who Tell the Truth* series began as Shetterly's response to the events following September 11, 2001, and has grown to over 260 portraits, showcasing individuals dedicated to social, racial, economic, and environmental justice.

Women's Rights National Historical Park

Seneca Falls, New York

Women's Rights National Historical Park is comprised of the visitor center, the historic homes (open seasonally), and the Wesleyan Chapel. The grounds of the historic buildings are open every day, while the interiors are open on a variable schedule based on the season. Please see Hours of Operation for the most up-to-date hours.

Wesleyan Chapel, 136 Fall Street, Seneca Falls, NY 13148

The Wesleyan Chapel is the location of the First Women's Rights Convention held on July 19 and 20, 1848, in which approximately 300 people gathered to attend. It is considered the birthplace of the Women's Rights Movement in the United States. Learn more about the Wesleyan Chapel.

Open Daily, Dawn to Dusk

A 100 foot long bluestone water feature located in Declaration Park (located between the Visitor Center and Wesleyan Chapel) is inscribed with the words of the Declaration of Sentiments. The home of Elizabeth Cady Stanton, the main organizer of the Seneca Falls' Woman's Right Convention and primary author of the Declaration of Sentiments.
